FOREWARD

This collection of Knoxville News-Sentinel (TN) articles was begun in February 2020 for the purpose of making historical information available for the 90th Anniversary Celebration of North Knoxville Baptist Church in Knoxville, TN. The Celebration was scheduled for March 29, 2000, but was cancelled because of the COVID-19 Pandemic. The church was founded January 19, 1930.

This is a fairly complete set of articles published from 1930 through 2023 in the Knoxviile News-Sentinel about North Knoxville Baptist Church. A few articles were omitted because they had no useful information concerning the history of the church. The search engine failed to find all files pertaining to the church, but no doubt it found the vast majority of them. All images were obtained by copying from the website of the Knox County Library System, and a personal subscription to Newspapers by Ancestry. com. Some of the images, particularly photos, did not reproduce well when they were digitized for the websites.

Some articles were modified by piecing them back together in a more readable format to fit the layout of the articles. Type sizes varied as well as sometimes being spread over several columns or pages, and photos were separated from articles. Also, a few of the referenced page numbers shown are sometimes off by one or two pages.

Get In Newsreel On Trip

To Virginia, And East-

ern Visit May Follow.

"D⁰, re, mi, fa, sol" they sing

Theirs are among the oldest songs in existence, they hold, and their type of singing is unique, practiced hardly anywhere outside this immediate section.

One of the two groups here, the Xnox County Old Harp Singers, may show New York what their songs are like pretty soon, through, according to R. H. Carter, leader.

"We've got a possible chance to go to New York," Mr. Carter said. "The man who made a newsreel of us at the White Top Mountain Festival and the women who sponsored our sing there are going to try to arrange the trip for us."

Twenty-one of the Knox County class made the trip to the white Top Mountain Festival week before last.

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Knox Old Harp Singers (Cont'd)

What It's Like

NOT many people know just what "harp singing" is. Mr.-Carter was asked.

"Well, every song in our book is over 200 years old," he explaned.

"Take this one. 'Old Hundred,' for instance. It's 2209 years old. It was sung at the Last Supper. That's right, ain't it Charlie?" he turned to the Rev. C. L. Murphy, another of the singers.

"Of course I can't vouch for it exactly," Mr. Murphy answered, "but I've always been told that."

Mr. Murphy then pointed out another salient characteristic of their songs.

"They were all written with a particular meaning." he said. "One in the time of a drouth and another during a flood or something."

Mr. Carter opened the song book at page 60, to a song called "Importunity."

"Here's what he means. They were praying for rain when they wrote that song. Each one in the book shows something of the condition of its time."

And they're all tried by time, he reiterated for emphasis.

"This new stuff they sing now has too much 'banjo work in it." Song Is Sung Twice

THE distinguishing feature about harp singing is the way the songs are sung.

First the notes are sung, the "do-se-mi," straight through the song one time, when it is started all over again and the words sung.

There's no plano or other instrument used—not even a barp. The name "Old Harp Singers." is said to have been taken from a famous old song book called the "Old Harp of Columbia."

"Just the hydraulic tune pitch or a tuning fork to give us the pitch," Mr. Carter said.

It wouldn't be "old timey" without the tuning fork, Mr. Murphy offered.

Then he took up the explanation again. "Our songs are not pitched like other music, and some good singers don't sound like anything when they try old harp music."

Mr Murphy himself is a "noted singer for song number 51," according to the leader.

Book's Out Of Print

THE song book they use is out of print and has been for years. Knox Old Harp Singers (Cont'd)

Fifteen years ago a Nashville publishing house made them a special order. And the only ones that can be bought now are a few in the possession of Lon Shields of Sevier County and N. W. Adcock, of \$25 Ferry Avenue.

Mr. Adcock, incidentally, is the dean of the Knor County Old Harp Singers. He is the oldest member of the class and has been a harp singer 42 years. "They were just changing from the old four-note scale to the seven-note book when I came here in 1867," he recalled.

The class includes four Baptist ministers, the Rev. C. L. Murphy, the Rev. James Reagan, the Rev. F. M. Carter and the Rev. E. O. Carter. The latter two are father and brother of the class leader.

There have been three generations of the Carters identitled with harp siging. The present leader's grandfather, the Rev. J. M. Carter was one of the founders in Claiborne County of the old [ifa-sol-la" four-note school of singing.

The president and permanent leader of the class, J. H. Shinpaugh, has been out of town this summer but the class has continued active. "We sing somewhere every Sunday,"," Mr. Carter said. "Every Sunday next month is already taken up and we have three all-day singings."

They'll be at the North Knorville Baptist Church on Oldham Avenue at 2 p. m. tomorrow.





It Isn't New To Bert

OLD Harp singing which has been publicized as typically East Tennessean, and which now seems to have a chance to get into New York as something Knox County has snatched from vanishing ploneer days, isn't any more typical of East Tennessee and Knox County than shuck beans, dried pumpkin and half-moon ples.

During all my eight years in Knorville I had heard of the Old Harpers. I had met the or-ganization's president, J. H. Shinpaugh, and he had asked:

"Have you heard us singing yet? Us Old Harpers?"

"Not yet," I answered. "Will though. Sure will."

Sunday the Old Harpers were advertised to sing at the North Knoxville Baptist Church on West Oldham Avenue. It was my chance. It was something I had looked forward to for eight years. I cancelled plans for a trip to Norris Lake for Sunday morning. I cancelled the baseball game at Caswell Park here in the afternoon. I would hear the Old Harp singers.

THE church was fairly well filled. Troy Car-ter, church leader and a Harp singer, stood with song book in hand. He said: "Folks, let's get started. Bass over on this

side. Treble singers over on that side. Soprano right in front here, and alto here. Page 107. Take the chord:

"Do-o...La-s-s-a...So-o-l!" "What's this?" I thought, edging up closer to the front. "Sounds familiar."

Then, away they went, the Old Harp singers, making the ceiling ring. There was the soprano. high and clear:

th and clear: "Do, do, do, re, me, me, me." The treble (tenor) higher still, with Charlie Johnson's voice above the rest:

"Si, si,-Sol, sol."

And the alto coming in with:

"La, ia, ia, me, me, me..." The bass, the Rev. C. L. Murphy and others, deep down in their throats, going:

"Fa, fa, fa...do."

Mind you, it was beautiful. This swing music and radio crooning, this modern soloing and quarteting in church choirs, couldn't best it. But-one could almost have poked me over with a finger-this Old Harp singing 1 was hearing. wasn't anything new nor different from what 1 had heard throughout central Kentucky, northern Georgia and northern Alabama.

The chances are that these same sacred hymns are being sung in the same manner in all the hill and mountain country east of the Mississippi and south of the Okio River.

In fact, it is the only sacred music that is sung in many sections. I never heard any other kind until I was almost grown. The only difference is that the singing I heard wasn't known as Old Harp. It was just singing.

Theodore Lane, whose address a short while ago was Mammoth Cave, Ky., was the leader. Professor Lane rode a horse over Grayson and Edmonson Counties getting up singing schools. The charge was 50 cents for 10 lessons. If he got as many as 38 to pay in he'd start the school, and he'd board around with the people.

The idea wasn't to learn music, however. Tť was just to have some place to go at night, Song books were 25 cents. Later and to sing. they went to 30.

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'Foretaste Of Heaven'

THIS column would be in poor taste however 1 if it didn't commend Mr. Shinpaugh, the Rev. C. L. Murphy, the Rev. F. M. Carter, Spence Shinpaugh, Mr. Johnson and a number of others for their efforts to make a large part of the world hear Old Harp singing.

These leaders succeeded in getting into the newsreel at the White Top Festival in Virginia a few weeks ago. This newsreel will be shown in many theaters. Thus some folk, at least, will learn that drinking moonshine and hiding be-hind trees and shooting at neighbors isn't the only pastime the mountain and hill people have.

Now, if they get into New York, it will be better still!

But-back to Sunday's sing. The Rev. Pierce Wilkerson, white-mustached veteran of the pal-

pit, welcomed the Old Harpers to the church. "This singing is a little foretaste of Heaven." he said. "Its music gets right down into my heart-right here. It makes ine happy." And, the Rev. Wilkerson seemed to have ex-

pressed the sentiment of much of the congregagation. Because there were "Amens! Amens!" from all over the house.

Then, when they sang the lilting music seemed to pick them up and carry them along. They kept time with their hands, down, jeft, right, up. Many sang without looking at the books. They sang through the notes first, and then they saug the words.

Leader Carter called upon other leaders to lead. One time Rev. Murphy was leading, and for some cause he believed he wasn't in the spirit of the music. He reached up, clutched some of his gray hair, and half running across the stage said:

"I don't know what in all the world's the

matter with me today. Seems I can't sing." All in all, though, it was great music. Sitting there listening I didn't mind at all missing the ball game.



The pool had not been opened to the public, but Eddie and a companion, W. H. Buckner, 23, had been working on the place. Young Buckner was already in swimming Thursday afternoon when Eddie ran and jumped in, where the water was about six feet deen.

"Apparently he struck flat, and may have suffered an attack of some kind. The physician said later there was no water in the lungs," said Tom Dempster today. Mr. Dempster's sisters, Mrs. Blanche D. Moffett and Mrs. Ida Moore, own the lodge and pool. George R. Dompster, business man, is another brother.

"The boy was taken from the water in a matter of minutes." Tom Dempster explained. "Bucknor wont to the rescue as did the father, Levi Evans, who is a tonant on the place and was working near by,

"State Patrolman Bill Rollins arrived shortly and gave artificial respiration longitily but it was unsuccessful. I understand the lad had been subject to solzures and that may have been a factor when he hit the cold water," he added.

Services were to be held at the Clatlinburg family home. Besides the parents, survivors include several brothers and sistors.
