FOREWARD

This collection of Knoxville Journal (TN) articles was begun in February 2020 for the purpose of making historical information available for the 90th Anniversary Celebration of North Knoxville Baptist Church in Knoxville, TN. The Celebration was scheduled for March 29, 2000, but was cancelled because of the COVID-19 Pandemic. The church was founded January 19, 1930.

This is a fairly complete set of articles published from 1930 through 1964 in the Knoxviile Journal about North Knoxville Baptist Church. A few articles were omitted because they had no useful information concerning the history of the church. The search engine failed to find all files pertaining to the church, but no doubt it found the vast majority of them. All images were obtained by copying articles from a personal subscription of Newspapers by Ancestry. com. Some of the images, particularly photos, did not reproduce well when they were digitized for the website.

Some articles were modified by piecing them back together in a more readable format to fit the layout of the articles. Type sizes varied as well as sometimes being spread over several columns or pages, and photos were separated from articles. Also, a few of the referenced page numbers shown are sometimes off by one or two pages.

Courageous Fight Ends; Street Car Victim Dies

Piucky Helen Marie Sharp succumbed yesterday at 4:30 a, m. at General Hospital where she had put up a courageous 33-hour battle against a fate that flung her body beneath a Knoxville Transit Lines car Saturday night.

The 16-year-old Rule Junior High School student remained confident

even while talking with members of her family late Sunday after her left leg had been amputated.

Physicians had acknowledged the odds were against Helen Marie's recovery. Her left shoulder, also mangled in the accident, went untreated in an effort to conserve her strength to combat the loss of the leg.

All Right If Lord Wills

"I hate to lose my leg," Helen Marie said as she was wheeled to the operating room Sunday morning, "but if it's the Lord's will it will be all right."

The young girl's fortitude was explained by those who knew her from the fact that "she was always thinking of other people and not about herself."

The first thing she said when rescuers got to her beneath the street car was:

"Don't let my sister know anything about this. She's sick and it might make her worse."

At the hospital Saturday night Helen Marie said: "Please tell everybody to be careful crossing street car tracks so nobody else will get hurt."

Trapped By Wheels

Robert Beard, skating rink employe who called the ambulance Saturday and who was present during the long wait for a wrecker to lift the street car, explained yesterday why Helen Marie had to remain under the car.

"The front wheel of the car had run over her left leg," Beard said, "and when the car came to a stop the leg was between the front wheel and the back wheel of the truck." If the street car had moved either forward or backward it would have run over her again.

"Helen Marie's body was between the tracks, entirely beneath the car, and her shoulder had been mangled by the cow-catcher," Beard said.

Talked Freely

Beard said his brother, Jack, crawled under the car to talk with Helen Marie until the wrecker came.

She asked if her leg was badly hurt and was told "no." "How do they go about getting a person out from under a car like this?" Helen Marie was quoted as asking.

At no time did the young girl lose consciousness and neither did she complain or cry.



Attendance grew rapidly, a spokesman of the church said, and an increase in membership necessitated a larger building. The present church building was built in 1932 on Oldham Avenue at Worth Street. The Rev. Jimmy Day was chosen first pastor. The new building for some time had a sawdust floor and was comprised of a large auditorium. Membership again began to increase and eventually more room was required. A fourroom house behind the church was recently purchased and four Sunday school classes now meet in it.

The church building, which now has 13 rooms, provides a meeting place for different departments of the church, including Baptist Training Union classes, Brotherhood, the Women's Missionary Union, and Sunday school classes.

Plans for New Building

But membership of the church has again increased. Plans for a new building started four years ago. At least \$500 had been set aside in 1944, one month before Mr. Wolfenbarger accepted the pastorate on Easter Sunday. Approximately \$15,000 has been solicited and plans for the new building are near completion.

A Boy Scout troop recently installed at the church performs regular duties for the church as well as for the community. Organized last February through the efforts of Tom Cinnamon, Sunday school superintendent, the unit spends more than 10 hours each week cleaning the church building. One Scout said that was "our good deed for the week." Four members of the troop serve as ushers in the church each Sunday. The troop has more than 30 members. Clarepce Riggs is scoutmaster.

Bible School to Close

The church's three-week Vacation B'ble School now in progress will close next Friday, commencement exercises to be held at 7:30 p. m. at the church. Mr. Wolfenbarger is principal of the school. Classes are held from 8:30 a. m. until 12 noon each day. The school, open to children between ages of four and 16, includes classes for beginners, primaries, juniors, and intermediates Before entering the ministry Mr. Wolfenbarger was a school teacher for nine years. His ability in leading young people is attributed to this experience by a church member.

Since Mr. Wolfenbarger assumed duties as pastor of the church, the Sunday School membership has more than doubled, and the church enrollment has increased by 226 members. Present membership is 700.
