FOREWARD

This collection of Knoxville News-Sentinel (TN) articles was begun in February 2020 for the purpose of making historical information available for the 90th Anniversary Celebration of North Knoxville Baptist Church in Knoxville, TN. The Celebration was scheduled for March 29, 2000, but was cancelled because of the COVID-19 Pandemic. The church was founded January 19, 1930.

This is a fairly complete set of articles published from 1930 through 2023 in the Knoxviile News-Sentinel about North Knoxville Baptist Church. A few articles were omitted because they had no useful information concerning the history of the church. The search engine failed to find all files pertaining to the church, but no doubt it found the vast majority of them. All images were obtained by copying from the website of the Knox County Library System, and a personal subscription to Newspapers by Ancestry. com. Some of the images, particularly photos, did not reproduce well when they were digitized for the websites.

Some articles were modified by piecing them back together in a more readable format to fit the layout of the articles. Type sizes varied as well as sometimes being spread over several columns or pages, and photos were separated from articles. Also, a few of the referenced page numbers shown are sometimes off by one or two pages.



Baby Killed as Brother **Topples Ice Box**

A 15-month-old boy is dead to-day from head injuries suffered when an icebox overturned on him .yesterday.

Michael Lynn Buckner, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Howard Buckner, 1728 Davanna Street, died at General Hospital at 4:45 p. m. yesterday, The accident oc-curred shortly after noon.

The parents said the child was playing with an older brother, Glenn, 4, when the icebox overturned. Exactly how it was pulled over was not determined. The father today said the children often played with canned goods placed on the lower shelf.

The grief-stricken parents made arrangements for burial of the baby tomorrow. At the home, young Glenn stayed close to his mother, who was so overcome she could scarcely talk,

'He Told Me Bye-Bye'

The father broke down when he looked at son's picture, then told a reporter:

"He was a doll—the prettiest little fellow. That's why God took him away, My baby came to the door Saturday, and told me byebye."

The icebox had been moved out on the back porch of the home on the back porch of the home today. Neighbors said Mrs. Buckner lifted the box and carried it out immediately after the accident, then carried the baby to a neighbor's house. The child was then taken to the hospital.

Mother Is War Bride

"She (Mrs. Buckner) wants me
to get rid of the icebox," Mr.
Buckner said today. "L don't want
the thing around either."
Earlier, Mrs. Buckner told hospital attendants the older brother was swinging on the icebox
door, causing it to reel over on
the baby. The box is little more the baby. The box is little more than four feet high, and sits on two-inch-wide less that run along each side.

The mother, an English war bride, is the former Edna O'Hanlon, of Manchester, England.

Married in Germany

The couple met in Belgium in 1945 while Mrs. Buckner was serving with a British anti-air-craft unit, and Mr. Buckner with a combat engineer's unit. He was

a combat engineer's unit, he was a staff sergeant.

They were married in Germany Dec. 27, 1945, and returned to this country later that year, separately, with Mr. Buckner arriving here first. The English grandparents of the child, Mr. and Mrs. J. O. O'Hanlon, saw Glenn two years ago when Mrs. Buckner visited there, but had never seen the younger child.

The father is 30, the mother 27. Mr. Buckner today said the ice-

'Mr. Buckner today said the ice-box was made of light, galvan-ized metal and could be moved easily. He said his wife had just finished bathing the baby, and was in the kitchen with both boys when they started playing around the icebox.

Ordinarily the father would have been home at the time, but he said he stayed on at the Electro-Mangahese Corp. plant, where he is employed, to work a double shift because some workers were sick.



Police Instructor Says:

Mothers' Patrol Easy To Train-'Their Heart Is in Their Work'

By MARGARET RAGSDALE

Mothers depend on other mothers for the safety of their children as many schools open and dismiss.

Thirteen women work under supervision of the Knoxville Police Traffic Department as members of the School Mothers' Patrol. They wear uniforms, which they furnish themselves, and Police Department badges. They are on duty at busy street intersections rain or shine, hot or cold, for three and a half hours each school day as youngsters cross traffic-laden streets to reach their schools.

Sgt. Earl Cronan supervises the school safety program and trains members of the Mothers' Patrol. It doesn't take long to train them, he says. "Their heart is in their work."

JOB IMPORTANT

"They do an awfully good job," he said. "Their job is especially important, because they can relieve a policeman for service elsewhere. This might make a great difference in a emergency."

Before the Mothers' Patrol, begun last year, "all available policemen were tied up in safety work at school intersections."

work at school intersections."

The Mothers' Patrol members work with Safety Patrol boys and girls at some of the schools; work alone at others, and, in certain cases, with a traffic officer.

Traffic police—and this means Mother's Patrol too — are assigned to 21 school zones from 8:15-8:45 a.m. and from 2-2:20 and 3-3:20 p.m.

"You can't do too much to promote safety," Sgt. Cronan says. He tells it to school groups and any group that is ready to listen.

STILL NOT ENOUGH

"Do all you possibly can for safety, and it's still not enough," he will tell you.

This reporter and a photographer accompanied Sgt. Cronan to Beaumont to see a "typical" Patrol Mother in action.

It was a minute or two before Mrs. Delilah Wright came out from the school office, her cap at a jaunty angle, her uniform carefully pressed and her white gloves freshly laundered. She was ready to begin her afternoon's work. Near her, Safety Patrol boys Danny Plaster, at Beaumont Avenue and McSpadden Street, and Franklin Lay, at Beaumont, were also helping to make the crossings safe for the younger children.

"Se tells those cars to stop, and they stop," said Franklin with great respect.

LOVES HER JOB.

Mrs. Wright loves her job. It shows in the way she handles the work.

"I love children, and parents, and the school, and the principal and the patrol work," she laughed. "I love everything about it—even the rain."

Mrs. Wright was the fifth Mothers Patrol member employed when the Patrol was organized last year.

She has two grown sons, and a daughter who is a student at Rule. She has worked in the P-TA for years.

Sometimes she stands in the middle of the street and, with hands upraised, stops traffic until the children can cross.

But energy stopping traffic is not equiph. She goes to the sidewalk and walks across with the "littlest ones." Sometimes her arms are around them and often their arms are around her. It's a demonstration of perfect trust and love.

Mrs. Wright doesn't just say "Hey, kids" or "Come on, you;" she tries to learn the name of each child who crosses at her intersection, during the three periods she works each day.

Motorists may look a little glum and impatient as she stops them in the name of safety. But she always smiles as she holds up her white - gloved hand to slow the traffic and always says a "Thank you" to each driver as he starts his car again.
