FOREWARD

This collection of Knoxville News-Sentinel (TN) articles was begun in February 2020 for the purpose of making historical information available for the 90th Anniversary Celebration of North Knoxville Baptist Church in Knoxville, TN. The Celebration was scheduled for March 29, 2000, but was cancelled because of the COVID-19 Pandemic. The church was founded January 19, 1930.

This is a fairly complete set of articles published from 1930 through 2023 in the Knoxviile News-Sentinel about North Knoxville Baptist Church. A few articles were omitted because they had no useful information concerning the history of the church. The search engine failed to find all files pertaining to the church, but no doubt it found the vast majority of them. All images were obtained by copying from the website of the Knox County Library System, and a personal subscription to Newspapers by Ancestry. com. Some of the images, particularly photos, did not reproduce well when they were digitized for the websites.

Some articles were modified by piecing them back together in a more readable format to fit the layout of the articles. Type sizes varied as well as sometimes being spread over several columns or pages, and photos were separated from articles. Also, a few of the referenced page numbers shown are sometimes off by one or two pages.

Council denies rezoning for car lot near church

Knoxville City Council members are unsure just what to do about a judge's Monday's ruling against them, but that ruling in favor of Calvary Baptist Church did not deter the council from risking an unrelated lawsuit by another developer.

The council — watched by 50 or more supporters of North Knoxville Baptist Church who attended Tuesday's meeting unanimously rejected a request by W.C. and Ginger Marshall for a commercial rezoning to allow a used car lot at Woodland Avenue and Branner Street.

The Marshalls' property now is zoned for industrial use and is across the street from a liquor store. It also is near where the North Knoxville Baptist congregation is planning a main entrance to the church. Because of those future plans, church members wanted the council to deny the rezoning.

"There was not any question about it — it was a political decision, not a rational decision based on fact," attorney Bill Petty, representing the Marshalls, said after the meeting. "It was about as clear-cut as one can get. "They (church members) politicked the council members, and there wasn't any other way they were going to vote. I knew going into the meeting how they were going to vote."

Petty told the council the Marshalls filled in a steep slope with dirt and were taking a "basically worthless" parcel and making it into a tax-producing business. MPC unanimously supported the Marshalls' proposed car lot, Petty said.

"Nothing is wrong, morally or ethically, with a used car lot," church member Tim Parker said. "But we don't want a used car business, potentially with junked cars, an eyesore, near a proposed beautiful entrance to our church.

Petty told the council, "To deny this is arbitrary and capricious. The church should not be able to tell the Marshalls they can't use their property in a lawful manner."

Area Baptists will play role in New Orleans convention

Several area Southern Baptist pastors have been nominated for denominational boards and appointed to key convention committee posts this year.

The convention will take place at the Astrodome in New Orleans June 12-14, and an estimated 50,000 messengers will decide whether the divided denomination will continue with another year of leadership by the so-called Bible inerrantists or whether a moderation to include other factions is reached.

The convention will be preceded by the Southern Baptist Pastors' Conference June 10-11.

The convention is being referred to as "The Battle of New Orleans" by some within the denomination.

The convention committees will help decide who is recognized as authorized messengers and, therefore, eligible to vote on denominational matters.

The boards will help determine policy for several years into the future.

The Rev. Guy M. Milam, pastor at North Knoxville Baptist Church since March 1967, has been nominated for the Home Mission Board, which is charged with missionary duties within the United States and its territories. Milam is a graduate of Harrison-Chilhowee Baptist Academy and attended Union University, Jackson, Tenn.

He is a past moderator of the Knox County Association of Baptists and is first vice president of the Tennessee Baptist Convention and a member of the TBC executive board.

Milam has been an evangelist for more than 100 churches in Tennessee, Alabama and Michigan since 1956.

North Knoxville Baptists work labor of love for one of own

It's tough to be burned out of the home you and your late husband had shared since World War II days.

Laura Petty decided her heart was planted too deep in the North Knoxville soil to move if she could manage to rebuild.

The men of her church, North Knoxville Baptist, made it possible by doing the rebuilding at no cost other than buying the materials.

Others, including her late husband's Masonic lodge, donated cash to help her get through the crisis.

Petty, 82-year-old widow of Raymond Petty, a Knox County deputy sheriff who died in 1977, moved back into her home at 1909 Worth St. last month, thankful she did not have to leave permanently.

Petty escaped without injuries when the house caught fire in December and an undiscovered box of shotgun shells started going off.

During the winter she stayed with her sister, Lula Davis, on Marietta Church Road while the men rebuilt her home.

"She paid for the ritaterials, but the men gave their time and labor," the Rev. Guy Milam, pastor of the church, said.

"We could have saved her several thousand dollars if the city had been willing to issue us a building permit, but they required us to hire a contractor, even though we had journeymen carpenters, plumbers and electricians working on the house."

The men at North Knoxville Baptist, at 217 W. Oldham Ave. — tucked between Central Street and Interstate 275 a block north of Woodland Avenue have long turned their talents to helping others. Under the late Bill Brooks, a member of the church who was Knox County Association of Baptists Brotherhood director, the men have gone on mission trips to other states to erect new church buildings or repair churches for others.

This time they turned their talents to the needs of a member of their own church who lived just two blocks north of the church building.

"Most of the credit for leading the project should go to Earl Cupp," Milam said. Cupp works for Rohm and Haas.

Others who Milam said helped in the rebuilding are Bill Mynatt, a fireman; Lloyd Norris at Moore's Building Supply Co.; Tim Parker; Grady McLain; Fate Nix; H.E. "Bud" Fraker; Johnny Brewton; and Raymond Keck. C. Joe Tolliver, an electrician, did electrical work and a nephew, W.A. "Bill" Jackson, got some of the supplies.

Herb Bomar and Pete Drinnon did the painting, Milam said.

"It apparently started in the wall behind my stove," Petty said of the fire. "Sweety, a little black Chihuahua, barked and woke me up when it started smoking.

"I pulled the stove's plug, but only one prong came out. I thought it would be all right and went back to bed. When she woke me up a second time, a stuffed chair near the stove had started smoking," Petty said.

"I tried to pull it out the door, but it wouldn't go through it and

then the explosions started. I had bought the chair at a secondhand store and didn't know that someone had put a box of shotgun shells under the cushion."

Petty had to back off from the exploding shotgun shells, and a next-door neighbor, Beatrice Adams, called the Fire Department.

Petty, dazed by the smoke and excitement, says she cannot recall the neighbor telling her she had called, nor the firemen arriving. She was taken to St. Mary's Medical Center for treatment.

Her nine dogs all died — most from smoke inhalation — when they could not get past the exploding shotgun shells at the open front door.

Petty mourns the loss of her pets but is appreciative of the men of the church and of Milam.

"He sent me a great big box of dishes," she said from her rebuilt home.

She said others had contributed furniture and cash to get her back on her feet. The Fountain City Masonic Lodge also supplied her with funds.

Milam, who has been pastor of the church for 23 years, has been nominated to serve on the Southern Baptist Convention's Home Mission Board, the agency that works with missions within the United States and its territories.

Vice president of Baptist group gives his rebuttal

Opposition's position statement triggers 'other side of the story'

The News-Sentinel recently ran a story about a statement by Baptists who disagree with stands taken by the controlling conservative leaders in the Southern Baptist Convention.

The Rev. Guy Milam, pastor of North Knoxville Baptist Church, vice president of the Tennessee Baptist Convention and a nominee by the conservative group to be a member of the Home Mission Board, has the following rebuttal.

Recently The Knoxville News-Sentinel carried an article reporting on a position statement issued by Dr. Douglas Watterson of Knoxville's First Bap-

tist Church and 17 other former State Baptist Convention presidents.

These 18 former presidents appointed themselves to denounce and decry the present conservative trend in the Southern Baptist Convention. These 18 claimed that the controversy was not theological in nature, but rather was political. They claimed that all Southern Baptists were in agreement on the nature of the Scriptures and were Biblebelieving Baptists. Now for the other side of the The Rev. Guy Milam story.



In 1985 the Southern Baptist Convention in Dallas, Texas, elected a 22-member "Peace Committee" composed of half moderates and half conservatives. Its assignment was to study the sources of the controversy and report back to the convention. On June 17, 1987, in St. Louis, Mo., the committee released a printed report which stated: "... the Peace Committee determined the primary source of the controversy is theological differences, but found .there are political causes as well."

The Peace Committee went on to report that they had found that most Southern Baptists believe that the Bible is "truth without mixture of error for its matter." They further stated that most Baptists believe that to mean that the Bible in its original manuscripts are without error in all areas: historical, theological, scientific and philosophical. They reported that as a result of surveying the faculties of six Southern Baptist seminaries, they had found that

there was not a proper balance on the faculties of Southern and Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminaries.

In their report they futher stated: "We call upon Southern Baptist institutions to recognize the great number of Southern Baptists who believe this interpretation of our confessional statement (that the Bible is without error historically, theologically, scientifically or philosophically) and, in the future, to build their professional staffs and faculties from those who clearly reflect such dominant convictions and beliefs held by Southern Baptists." This report was adopted and approved by an estimated 96 percent of the messengers present and voting. The (report) is available through any Baptist Book Store.

Conservative Southern Bapusts have won the presidency for the past 11 consecutive years through a political process known as an "election." The moderate/liberal faction have characterized the winning of the presidency as a "takeover" of the Southern Baptist Convention. Each year the presidents and all officers have been duly elected by the Southern Baptist Convention through a democratic election where the majority rules. Who are these messengers who do the electing?

They are Baptists who have been elected by their local churches local churches that are in "friendly cooperation" with the work of the Southern Baptist Convention and have supported convention causes financially.

Each church is entitled to no more than 10 messengers - one for each \$250 contributed to the convention's work. Each messenger casts only one vote and the majority determines who is elected and what the will of the body seems to be. The constitution and bylaws of the Southern Baptist Convention require that the majority must prevail. Every Baptist has his say, but only the majority has its way! What is undemocratic or unfair about that? Only the moderate/liberal faction is unhappy with the present course of the Southern Baptist Convention. The word "faction" is used here to denote the minority. The 18 former Baptist State Convention presidents, of which Dr. Watterson was one, spoke for the minority faction - not for the majority.

The conservative Southern Baptists wish the public to know that they believe in a perfect Bible - one that is without error historically, scientifically, theologically or philosophically. They further want the public to know that they are electing officers who will see that their position is represented in the institutions and agencies of their convention. They do not wish to pay the salaries of those who believe otherwise. The conservative majority believe that they have that right. After all, the agencies and institutions of the Southern Baptist Convention are not federally or publicly supported. They belong to and are accountable to the Southern Baptist Convention, which, by the way, is the "messengers" elected by the member local churches sent to do tusiness on behalf of the local churches.

The late President Harry Truman once said, "Politics is the art of government." Those who vote choose leadership and make policies. In a democracy the right to vote is not only a privilege, but is a responsibility. The minority has the right of dissent. But let the public and the press recognize the right of the majority to elect its own leadership within the parameters of its own constitution and bylaws. The proper way to effect change is to convince the majority of the rightness of your position. Conservative Southern Baptists are winning elections at the annual convention because the majority believe in a perfect Bible inspired and given by a perfect God. Now you have the other side of the story.

A drizzling rain fell on the bronze coffin of Councilman Milton Roberts as he was carried to his final resting place Wednesday.

A dress uniform corps of firefighters snapped to attention and saluted as the casket, borne by members of the Knoxville Volunteer Rescue Squad, passed by toward the gravesite in Lynnhurst Cemetery.

Nearby stood an honor guard of Knoxville policemen, who later were to fire a 21-gun salute. Two fire crews stood beside gleaming fire engines, next to Knoxville police cruisers and Blue Hawk motorcycle officers.

"I have a message for you," the Rev. Guy Milan, pastor of North Knoxville Baptist Church, told those gathered. "Six or eight weeks ago, Milton called and asked me to come to his hospital room.

"He told me his doctors gave him less than three months to live, but he wanted me to tell you that he had a deep relationship with the Lord, that he had made his peace and all was well with his soul.

"Preacher, don't spend any time telling what I've done in my life," Milan quoted Roberts as saying, "but give these messages:

"Tell my friends I am deeply grateful for their friendships.

"Tell my family I love them more than anything in this world.

"And tell my dear wife of my love and compassion for her always."

Minister says 'he had made his peace'

Atop the casket in front of the minister lay a simple bouquet of four red roses, tied with red and black ribbon. It had been Roberts' wish that it be so, a rose for each of his three children and another for his wife, tied with a bow of the colors of Central High School, his alma mater.

Milan said that first visit led to many others in which the two men

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talked about life, death, love and religion.

"I've buried many people," Milan quoted Roberts, owner of Roberts Funeral Home, as saying, "but when it is told to you that your death is so near, it is the most somber moment of your life. Material things just no longer matter."

Roberts' widow, Frances, and his daughter, two sons and their families sat under tents as the rain fell.

"This is an appointment we all are going to face," Milan continued. "Milton knew that. He knew this is not the end, that there is an eternal abode. To be absent from the body is to present with the Lord."

Milan said Roberts took great comfort that "there's a great day coming... by and by."

Roberts, 85, died at St. Mary's Medical Center on Sunday after a lingering battle with cancer. His 40 years on the City Council represent the longest service on record.

After Milan at the service came Father Albert Henkel of Holy Ghost Catholic Church, who said Roberts "turned the darkness of death into a new life. This was a way of death as an example for us all."


As the rain softened to a patter on the canvas tents, those attending recited the Lord's Prayer.

Knox Baptists to change constitution and bylaws

The Knox County Association of Baptists is expected to change its constitution and bylaws at its annual meeting Monday and Tuesday. Among other things, there will be a final vote on changing the wording of its constitution to allow membership by churches from outside the county's boundaries.

The move is not an effort to try to expand the association, said Dr. Walter Taylor, the director of missions. Rather, it is to accomodate Cedar Ford Baptist Church of Union County, which applied for membership in 1985 and was accepted.

Such a change requires two associational votes of approval by a two-thirds majority in succeeding meetings. Such an approval was voted in 1988, but the association failed to vote again on the matter last year.

To remedy the situation, the association met in a special called session this past Monday and voted approval following the regular associational executive board meeting at Wallace Memorial Baptist Church.

The second vote is scheduled

for 9:45 a.m. Monday at North Knoxville Baptist Church, 217 W. Oldham Ave.

The association traditionally divides its two-day meeting between two churches. The association messengers will meet Monday at the North Knoxville church from 9:30 a.m. to noon and from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m.

Tuesdays meetings will be during the same hours at Immanuel Baptist Church, 306 Ogle Ave.

The association also is expected to vote on an annual budget of just under \$767,000. This represents a drop of almost \$38,000 from the 1989-1990 budget, reflecting the expectation of a drop in offerings as part of the national economic slowdown.

The association will hear a report on associational strategy planning that results from a survey of churches in the county.

The Rev. Terry Taylor, pastor at Beaver Dam Baptist Church, will deliver the annual sermon at 11:30 a.m. Monday.

The Rev. Dr. Jere Phillips, director of missions for the Tennessee Baptist Convention, will close the meeting at 8:30 p.m. Tuesday with a message on state missions.





Baptists to lead 120th campground meeting

4 denominations began Greenback event

GREENBACK — This year's annual camp meeting at the National Campground will be the 120th, a tradition that stretches back to a time just after the Civil War when four denominations decided to do something to tring families and neighbors, torn apart by the war, back together.

The first meeting, in August 1873, was held in a large tent after five denominational leaders decided to hold an interdenominational revival. They were Baptists, Cumberland Presbyterians, Presbyterians, Methodist Episcopal (and Methodist Episcopal, South) and the Society of Friends (Quakers). For 120 years they have taken turns filling the pulpit.

pulpit. That original tent is reported to have been a hospital tent during the Civil War. The first year's service was so successful the originators decided to buy land and make it a permanent annual affair.



The campground is off Highway 95 between Greenback and Lenoir City, about four miles northeast of Greenback. It was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1972. The benches remain plain wood and sawdust covers the ground.

Camp meetings got their name because in the 1800s people would come from miles around by wagon,

or riding on the backs of horses or mules. After the service was over, it was too far to go home again, so they would camp evernight on the grounds.

A cookhouse was built nearby, by a spring, which allowed the camping families to cook their own meals for the meetings, which usually lasted for about a week. The National Campground,

The National Campground, formerly called the Union Campground, is believed to be the oldest camp meeting ground still in use in the state.

The sturdy wooden shed, open at the sides, is still supported by the same hand-hewn beams placed there in 1873 as the shed replaced the original tent.

A large dinner bell, donated by one of the founders, calls the worshipers to the service each night. The bell was stolen once, about 1970, but a son of a foundation board member found it in a Maryville antique shop. He bought it and returned it to its rightful place.
